3. About this qualification

3.1 Purpose

The VTCT (ITEC) Learner 2 Diploma in Barbering is a vocational qualifications for learners who wish to pursue a career in barbering/men's hairdressing and for those learners who have undertaken women's hairdressing and wish to diversify and specialise in men's barbering.

This qualification is based on the national occupational standards in the United Kingdom for barbering and includes all the required elements to work effectively as a junior barber/men's stylist. Learners must achieve all eight mandatory units, which include:

- · Advise and consult with clients for men's hair services
- Shampoo, condition and treat men's hair and scalp
- Cutting men's hair using basic techniques
- Dry and finish men's hair
- Cut facial hair to shape using basic techniques
- Create basic outlines and detailing in hair
- Clipper maintenance
- Hair tonics

This qualification is most suitable for those learners who wish to become a junior barber/men's stylist encompassing all of the technical skills required within a barbershop/salon or for self-employment. It rewards learner's individual abilities both in practical and theory with a graded outcome of Fail/Pass/Merit/Distinction.

3.3 Progression

Learners who achieve this qualification are able to work as a junior barber/men's stylist, learners could work in a variety of different sectors, which might include:

- Commercial barbershops/salons
- Independent/self-employed/mobile/home-based salon settings
- Training and assessment within private centres/colleges
- Cruise liners
- · Television, film, theatre and media
- Hospitals/care homes

Additionally learners may choose to develop their knowledge and skills by undertaking a Level 3 Men's Hairdressing or Level 3 Barbering qualification.

4. Qualification structure

To be awarded the VTCT (ITEC) Level 2 Diploma in Barbering learners must achieve:

- all mandatory units
- the theory examinations
- the synoptic practical examination

The minimum TQT required to achieve this qualification is 520.

5. Centre requirements

5.1 Approval and recognition

Existing centres that wish to deliver this qualification must obtain recognition using the standard qualification recognition procedures.

New centres that want to deliver this qualification must gain both centre approval and qualification recognition. Please refer to the awarding organisations website for further information.

Centre staff should be familiar with current practices and standards in the sector and with the qualification structure, content, assessment and quality assurance arrangements before designing a course programme.

5.2 Resources

Centres must possess the physical resources and suitable environment needed to support the delivery of the programme and the assessment of knowledge and skills, which should therefore be of industry standard. Where specific resources are required these have been indicated in the content of individual units.

It is recommended the following items are available for learners:

- Salon equipment to include:
 - Brush/broom, pan and covered receptacle for disposing of hair cuttings, sterilising equipment, wipes and/or fluid sharps box
 - Basins, working units with mirrors and back mirrors
 - Barber's chairs
 - Hand-held hairdryers, electrical styling equipment (Refer to the unit content for requirements)
 - Sets of hair clippers and attachments/guards
 - Electrical accelerator/steamer
 - Full range of shampooing, conditioning, tonics and treatment products
 - Full range of salon products, tools and equipment for all salon services including chemical services where appropriate
- Reception desk/area to include:
 - Telephone and till, internet, books, magazines, service/treatment price lists
 - Retail products/items
- Health and safety products, tools and equipment, to include:
 - Personal protective equipment (PPE), towels, gowns, gloves, aprons and capes, sharps
 bin, cleaning equipment and bins with lids and disposable liners for disposing of waste

5.3 Teaching staff

In order to deliver this qualification, teaching staff must:

- Be occupational experts and have knowledge and understanding in the area for which they
 are delivering training. This knowledge must be at the same level as or higher than the
 training being delivered
- Understand the qualification's structure and content, and the learning outcomes they are delivering;
- Have recent and relevant industry experience in the specific area they are delivering
- Have credible experience of teaching and/or providing training
- Undertake activities which contribute to their continuing professional development (CPD).

5.4 Verification

The lecturer/internal assessor will assess and mark the service portfolios and the external examiner will verify a sample, either in situ on the day of the practical exam or remotely on e-portfolio.

5.5 Total Qualification Time (TQT)

TQT is defined under the Ofqual General Conditions of Recognition, General Condition J1.8, as the number of notional hours which represents an estimate of the total amount of time that could reasonably be expected to be required in order for a learner to achieve and demonstrate achievement of the level of attainment necessary for the award of a qualification.

TQT is comprised of the following two elements:

- the number of hours which an awarding organisation has assigned to a qualification for Guided Learning, and;
- an estimate of the number of hours a learner will reasonably be likely to spend in preparation, study or any other form of participation in education or training, including assessment, which takes place as directed – but, unlike Guided Learning, not under the immediate guidance or supervision of – a lecturer, supervisor, tutor or other appropriate provider of education or training.

The TQT for this qualification is detailed in Section 4 of this specification.

6. Assessment

6.1 Summary of assessment methods

This qualification comprises internal and external assessments. Learners must achieve the assessments detailed in the table below.

6.3 Theory examination

The specification for the theory examination is detailed below.

Grades achieved in each external examination are awarded points that contribute to the overall qualification grade.

Examinations must be undertaken by learners under controlled examination conditions in accordance with VTCT's policies and procedures for external assessment.

6.4 Synoptic practical examination

The synoptic practical examination is externally set, externally examined, graded and quality assured by external examiner. Information on how to operate practical examinations can be found the on awarding organisations website.

In preparation for the synoptic practical examination, centres are advised to ensure learners have completed their service portfolios and an internal mock practical examination. As part of the service portfolio learners are required to have completed their style collection before the synoptic practical examination is taken. The style collection work must be available for the external examiner to view on the day of the synoptic practical examination.

It is essential centres use the Synoptic Practical Examination Criteria document in order to make assessment judgements when preparing for examinations. This can be found on the awarding organisation's website.

The synoptic practical examination preparation must take place in a realistic working environment on a real client and in a commercially acceptable time frame.

6.4.1 Retaking external examinations

Learners who fail to achieve the required Pass mark are permitted to re-sit after having sufficient teaching and additional study time. There is no limit to the number of retakes a learner can carry out.

6.4.2 Reasonable adjustments and special considerations

Information on the reasonable adjustments allowed for the external examinations within this qualification can be found in the policies section on the awarding organisations website.

6.5 Service portfolio

A service portfolio for each unit is required to be completed under the supervision of a lecturer who must monitor the quality of the services performed throughout the learner's training. The criteria of what must be included in the service portfolio is detailed in the unit specification and the learner logbook which are available to download from the website.

This service portfolio will include a style collection for:

- iUHB320 Cutting men's hair using basic techniques
- iUHB321 Dry and finish men's hair
- iUHB322 Cut facial hair to shape using basic techniques
- iUHB323 Create basic outlines and detailing in hair


7. Grading

7.1 Overview

This qualification is graded Pass/Merit/Distinction.

There are two separate components in the grading model for this qualification, the graded external examinations and a graded external synoptic practical examination. The graded external examination components contributes 30% and the graded external synoptic practical examination component contributes 70% to the overall qualification grade.

Learners must achieve a Pass grade or higher in the external theory examinations and synoptic practical examination. The grades achieved in each assessment correlate to points. These points will then be added together to determine the overall grade of the qualification, as shown below:



7.2 Grade boundary review

Grade boundaries for units and the overall calculation for the qualification grade are open to annual review. Following this review, these boundaries and overall calculations can be adjusted by VTCT. This review and possible change within a qualification are to ensure the standard of the qualification grade is upheld throughout the qualification's lifecycle.

8. External examiner

8.1 External examiner visits

This qualification is externally examined by the awarding organisation. Centres delivering this qualification will have a quality assurance visit each time an examiner visits the centre.

On a centre visit an examiner:

- examines all learners entered for the external practical examination
- samples learners' service portfolio
- verifies that appropriate staff and sufficient resources are in place, and that the centre is continuing to meet the criteria specified in the centre contract
- checks that the centre's policies and procedures continue to meet the awarding organisation's requirements
